




Educating the Whole Lawyer

What can you study?

Our curriculum is expansive. Outside of traditional areas such as employment and criminal law, we have courses in areas you may not have considered, and we continually evolve our offerings. The law, after all, is ever-changing.

Visual Persuasion

A picture is worth a thousand words. Learn how visual aids, like art, advertisements, and dioramas, can support persuasive case-making.

Video Game Law

Video games constitute one of the fastest-growing media industries in the past few decades. This course covers legal concepts in the fields of video game development, publishing, esports, and streaming.

Space Law

What are the regulations concerning space debris? How do we determine the governance of extraterrestrial colonies? As humanity extends our reach to the stars, we encounter new legal frontiers.

Therapeutic Jurisprudence

Interacting with the legal system can be stressful. This course prepares you to support the mental wellbeing of clients.

Historic Preservation

What responsibility do we have to protect the past? What sites are suitable to preserve? What happens at the intersection of aesthetics, politics, and the law? This course examines reasons for and against historic preservation with a special focus on sites in and around Connecticut.









Building Bridges to Success

Just as important as understanding legal theory and doctrine is learning what it means to do the work of a lawyer. Our three-part **Bridge to Practice** program places the concepts from your classroom experience into a true-to-life context. From the start of the 1L year, students learn directly from practicing lawyers and judges, giving them real-world insight into the experience of legal professionals from a wide range of practice areas.

Bridge to Practice gives you a head start on the learning that often takes place on the job, preparing you to accelerate your career upon passing the bar. From building a solid first-year professional foundation through post-graduation bar preparation, the program creates a seamless pathway to professional success.

Bridge I: Foundations

In Bridge I, you will build fundamental professional skills, legal research abilities, and a strong academic foundation. Coursework and small group activities with 1L peers will help shape your professional identity and provide the essential career planning support that will prepare you for success in law school and beyond.

Bridge II: Applied Learning and Bar Preparation

Through a combination of experiential learning and foundational coursework, you will deepen your readiness for practice and lay the groundwork for bar success. Bridge II comprises six credits of hands-on legal experience alongside focused courses that provide critical context for navigating the practice of law.

Bridge III: Post-Graduate Success

The final stage of Bridge to Practice provides invaluable support between graduation and the bar exam. Graduates have access to a commercial bar review course, along with structured study environments, wellness resources, and simulated testing experiences, ensuring you have the resources to succeed on the bar exam and transition confidently into practice.

Passing the bar is a momentous step in every aspiring lawyer's journey, and at Quinnipiac Law, we do not leave your success to chance. Our Bridge to Practice program integrates targeted bar preparation into your upper-class curriculum and extends support into the post-graduate period. With personalized resources, dedicated study spaces, and a focus on wellness, we empower students to approach the bar exam with confidence, clarity, and a strategic edge.

Clinics and Externships

Clinics and externships are where classroom learning meets real-world impact. You will work under the mentorship of a law professor or practicing lawyer and contribute meaningfully to actual legal cases with real clients, real judges, and real stakes.

At Quinnipiac Law, every student is guaranteed the opportunity to participate in a clinic or externship, and most students elect to take more than one. Whether you are drafting a criminal appeal, mediating a housing dispute, advocating for a veteran's benefits, or something else entirely, these experiences will build your skills, strengthen your confidence, and help you discover your place in the legal profession.

At Quinnipiac, students do not just study the law—they use it to make a difference. Through clinics and externships, you will tackle real legal challenges in areas like criminal justice, tax advocacy, and immigration law.

In a case in Quinnipiac's Tax Clinic, students worked to overcome procedural hurdles and long delays by the Internal Revenue Service. Ultimately, the client's case was successfully resolved, eliminating over \$100,000 in tax liability attributable to the client's former spouse. Ross Spano '25, who was honored with the Excellence in Tax Advocacy Award, reflected on the experience: "I didn't think that during law school I would be able to make such a positive impact on someone else's life. But thanks to the hard work of everyone in the clinic, we were able to deliver the long-awaited positive news."

Impact In Action

Here is a snapshot of some of the ways that our students have made a difference:

Immigration After a trial in immigration court, clinic students won a grant of gender-based asylum for a Salvadoran woman and her teenaged son whose case had been pending for 8 years. Students then obtained legal status for her husband, who had lived here for almost 25 years.

Privacy One student was integrally involved with a multistate project coordinating privacy laws, assuring that new and upcoming "connected cars" are not inadvertently exposing customers to privacy concerns.

Prosecution Students with the Prosecution Appellate Clinic argued before the Connecticut Supreme Court in a prominent murder case. The issue on appeal was whether the Supreme Court should adopt a rule that police must allow a minor to meet privately with a parent or guardian before interrogating that minor.

Family Law During an externship with Lawyers for Children America, a student participated in home visits, investigations, and various hearings to ensure children's needs were best represented. This included attempting to reunite children with their parents or finding safer living arrangements.

Cold Cases Student externs at the Cold Case Unit of the State's Attorney's Office examined witnesses at trial and functioned as a key part of the trial team on a case of first impression in Connecticut. They used genealogy DNA evidence to identify and convict a defendant of a series of sexual assaults committed in the 1980s

Participate in our annual Public Interest Law Project (PILP) Auction and help raise money for pro bono internship placements. Show off your creativity-and your sewing skills-during the Halloween Costume Contest. Join one (or more) of the 30+ student organizations on campus, such as the Student Bar Association, Business Law Society, or Human Trafficking Prevention Project. At Quinnipiac, we believe that balance isn't just possible, it is essential to becoming a whole lawyer.

Every law student needs space to grow and the Nutmeg State offers plenty of room to breathe, reflect, and explore. Connecticut boasts 110 state parks and 32 state forests where you can engage in all types of outdoor recreation, from hiking and biking to kayaking and canoeing.





What's beyond the horizon?

With our campus as a home base, you have access to a wealth of opportunities to travel, explore, and expand your personal and professional networks. New Haven, our neighbor to the south, is a popular destination to meet up with friends for coffee or a bite to eat. Hartford, Connecticut's capital, is only 30 minutes to our north. Students interested in public policy or government often complete externships there. We also sit at a central location between New York and Boston, two cities with expansive legal histories, communities, and opportunities.

For longer trips, Tweed New Haven Airport is just 15 minutes from campus and Bradley International Airport is 45 minutes away.



"I've known I wanted to do criminal defense since 6th grade," Heather Mansfield recalls. "But it took a lot of work to make myself believe I could do it." At Quinnipiac, not only was her confidence bolstered, but she had opportunities to prove her resilience. As part of the Civil Justice Clinic, she was offered a high-stakes case concerning a Central American woman fleeing gang violence. "It was one of those experiences where you realize the law is a calling and not just a job," she said. "I had a woman's life in my hands."

Following graduation, Heather earned the position of law clerk at the Connecticut Supreme Court, a highly prestigious honor. "There's no single blueprint for success in this profession," said Heather. "There was a time that I thought I would have to transform into a different person to succeed in law school, but this community has taught me that who I am as a lawyer is tied to who I am as a person. Quinnipiac allows you to develop every aspect of your identity."





Isaiah Chavez '27

A lifelong Texan, Isaiah Chavez had minimal familiarity with the Northeast. Visiting Quinnipiac School of Law was eye-opening; he recommends anyone who is considering the school do the same. "I remember calling my family from the airport after the visit and telling them that I wanted to come here no matter what. Every school claims they have a great community, but it truly felt like a family at Quinnipiac." During his 1L year, he discovered an interest in transactional law to complement his existing passion for

civil rights, which is part of why he also advocates taking reasonable risks and putting yourself out there. "Take it from me as someone coming from out of state, as someone from a minority background, as a first-generation law student: There are times when you need to forget the imposter syndrome and take a leap of faith," he said. "If you never take that leap, you will never really know what opportunities are out there for you and what you can amount to."

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"As an administrative assistant in the juvenile court, I had the pleasure of working with Quinnipiac alumni before I decided to apply to the law school. They were always respectful, courteous, and well-prepared attributes that I have come to associate with the whole lawyer. I hope to be a courtroom litigator, and to be that kind of lawyer: Someone who not only has the ability to write the motions and do the research, but also builds a genuine relationship with their client."



Admissions Information

Applicants aspiring to join our community must have earned a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university (or foreign equivalent) and have completed the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) and writing sample. While past academic performance and LSAT scores are important aspects of an application, we also consider additional factors including (but not limited to): letters of recommendation; the clarity and quality of writing (throughout the entire application); advanced degrees; employment history; commitment to community service; experience navigating social, educational, physical, or economic challenges; moral character; academic growth and improving grades; rigor of undergraduate curriculum; extracurricular activities; distinctions/honors achieved; and life experience.

Quinnipiac Law accepts applications up until August I. We encourage applicants to apply as early as possible and suggest applications be submitted by early March for optimal fall admission and scholarship consideration.

We offer fall enrollment for our full-time day or part-time evening programs. The part-time program typically takes four years to complete. Part-time students may transfer into the full-time program after successfully completing two semesters, potentially earning the JD degree in three years.

Financial Aid & Scholarships

Tuition for the 2025–2026 academic year is \$56,610 for full-time students and approximately \$39,600 for part-time students, based on an average of 20 credits per year at \$1,980 per credit. Students incur additional expenses for housing, food, transportation, and books. Financial assistance is available to students through federal and private loans, scholarships, and Federal Work-Study. Approximately 97 percent of all enrolled students receive funding through these sources.


